Going to college and being legally blind was pretty scary, but my high school counselor took me to Missouri Western herself and introduced me to staff there. I decided to go and lived in the residence halls.

Things got a little easier when I got my service dog, Daisy. She and I were pretty noticeable going around campus. We had to educate everyone about the proper etiquette about being around a service dog.

My father died in high school and my mother died during my freshman year in college, but I found support through my social work department and many other people I met at college. I graduated in May 2003 and got hired to work at the YWCA at the Women's Abuse Shelter. It's not been easy, but definitely worth the hard work.

Since 1991, your local **Disability and Business Technical Assistance Centers (DBTACs)**^{*} have been providing information, materials, technical assistance and training on the ADA. In 2001, their responsibilities expanded to include providing those same services in the area of accessible information technology. This includes building accessible web pages, assuring that distance learning programs are accessible and assuring that technology purchases are those which are best able to work with assistive devices used by people with disabilities.

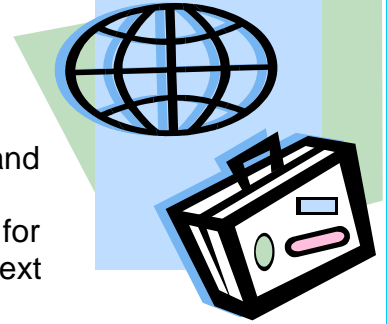
The DBTAC's work in the area of accessible IT is supported by the new National Center on Accessible Information Technology in Education, known as [AccessIT](http://www.accessit.org). WIN AHEAD: Look Who's Going International

The Fifth International Conference on Higher Education and Disability was held in Innsbruck, Austria, July 27-30, 2004. This conference, organized by the University of Innsbruck and the University of New Orleans, is a forum for college and university staff worldwide to share best practices regarding working with students with disabilities. **Lisa Kramme, Director of Academic Support Services at Midland Lutheran College in Fremont, Nebraska,** and Wade Pearson, Director of the Office of Disability Accommodations at Creighton University in Omaha, gave a presentation entitled, "Building Bridges: The Transition from High School to College."

Kramme and Pearson are members of Western Iowa and Nebraska Association of Higher Education and Disability (WIN AHEAD). Members of WIN AHEAD are postsecondary disability service providers who have developed a presentation that has been widely requested regarding the transition of students with disabilities from high school to a college setting. WIN AHEAD has received monetary support from the Nebraska Department of Education for the past three years in order to make presentations throughout the state of Nebraska, and to date over 800 people have been in attendance at these programs.

Kramme and Pearson's presentation at the international conference shared information on this collaboration of regional postsecondary institutions and their partnership with transition teams from state agencies and public schools. It also identified what transition information should be presented to secondary school psychologists, special education instructors, and school administrators as well as parents and students.
