Career path leading to current work: I graduated in 1997 with a Bachelors degree in Communication Sciences and Disorders. My first job in education was as a Speech Implementer in Branson School District. I worked with students K-2. After two years I moved to Eugene, OR and worked as a crew leader for the Northwest Youth Corp working with youth 16-19 in an outdoor setting. I returned to Missouri in 2001 and was fortunate to find a position in a school district in October. Again, I was a speech implementer. At this time I decided I wanted to make a bigger impact than 30-60 minutes a week in students' lives.
